Congratulations on finishing the 1987 Budget Melbourne Marathon. Thank you for supporting our Tenth Anniversary Marathon — it is a great milestone in Australian marathon history.

I am indeed proud of the Budget Marathon which has become an institution as Australia's largest and most prestigious marathon. The huge percentage of community runners who set out each year to do battle with the 42.195 kilometres are, in fact, the life blood of the marathon. This year we acknowledge the 'Spartans' — those runners who have run our ten marathons — there are 86 men plus 2 women; congratulations to each of you!

A big thank you to Bob Ansett and his company, Budget Rent a Car, our major sponsor. To all sponsors who played such a major role in the success of our marathon, we are indeed grateful for your support.

Congratulations to our winners, Ric Sayre, U.S.A., a magnificently judged race also a fine ambassador. Jackie Turney, who after a very serious injury, recorded her second victory; both popular wins. To the V.A.A. Marathon Champions Maurice Hearn and Jackie Turney — well done!

The signing of our first 'sister marathon' agreement was another major achievement. This ceremony took place on Monday, October 12, 1987. The delegation was led by Mr. Sato, Director of The Nikkan Sports Press sponsors of the Lake Kawaguchi Marathon. Nikkan Sports is the largest daily sporting newspaper in Japan, with a circulation of 1.5 million. Our 'sister marathon' agreement is effective 1988.

We welcomed the Budget Melbourne Marathon Friendship Tour from Japan which included 13 Japanese competitors. The increase of overseas entrants this year, 88 from 20 countries, indicates the recognition our marathon has overseas; I am confident this trend will continue.

The associated events during 1987 were of a very high standard. Our three Clinics, supported by the Department of Sport and Recreation, were conducted at Geelong, Melbourne and Traralgon, with guest speakers Bill Scott, Chris Wardlaw and Steve Moneghetti supported by Dr. Peter Larkins and his professional panel of speakers were most successful and all well attended.

To all volunteers a special thank you, to our new race manager, David Edwards, well done! A special thanks to my own staff and also the committee of Melbourne Marathon Incorporated.

1988 is Australia's Bicentennial Year and our marathon is an endorsed Bicentennial event. I look forward to your support in 1988 for what promises to be a great marathon. We will welcome delegates from international marathons around the world when we host the 5th World AIMS, Association of International Marathons and Road Races, Congress in conjunction with our 1988 marathon.

Good luck with your running and please join us for our Bicentennial marathon in 1988.

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SIGNIFICANT MILESTONE

Was 1987 the 10th Melbourne Marathon, or the 10th anniversary of the Melbourne Marathon? I reckon it was the former.

Any way you look at it, however, 1987 represented a significant milestone in the history of the Melbourne Marathon, a race we now know as the Budget Melbourne Marathon, but, in an inspired connection between city, race and sponsor, used to call 'the Big M'.

Bob Ansett is one of Australia's leading businessmen - few would have such a high public profile. His zeal for personal fitness is also reflected with his company and his involvement as President of the North Melbourne Football Club.

Back in 1983 Bob ran the marathon with his wife Josi; when the opportunity was presented to sponsor

the race in 1986 he quickly accepted and so started a new era for the marathon

The increase in overseas runners. particularly from Japan, is attributable to Bob. He is also Chairman of the Hosting Committee for the AIMS (Association of International Marathons and Road Races) 5th World Congress, to be held in conjunction with the 1988 marathon.

Budget has in a short time made a significant contribution to the history of the marathon.

As part of the promotion of the 10th Melbourne Marathon, 'The Age' this year produced a supplement on the race, the first time this had been done. When you read the saturation coverage the 'Boston Globe' gives the Boston Marathon each year, you realise the potential of mass media involvement for building the impact of a community event. It is to be hoped the supplement will become an annual event.

But I digress. When the sports

editor asked for ideas on content for the supplement, one was to talk to Bill Scott, one of Australia's best distance runners of the 1970s and 1980s, and the man who was first across the line in the first Melbourne Marathon.

Now as far as career achievements go, the first Melbourne Marathon would not rank highly on Bill Scott's list. It was not his first, not his fastest, not his most competitive, not his best. It was, he said, "just a run".

The marathon, in fact, was not even the distance at which Bill Scott achieved the most fame. He is best remembered by his contemporaries for the uncompromising way he went out to chase fast times in an attempt to bring Australian track distance running back up to the standards of the Clarke-era. The general public probably remember him best for his epic battle with Henry Rono over 10,000 metres at Olympic Park in February, 1980, which produced the fastest 10,000 by an Australian in Australia for Scott and the fastest for

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anyone from Rono. Scott went on to reach the Olympic final later that year.

Scott remembered then that he got greater media exposure and more recognition for his Melbourne Marathon win than from any other of his six marathons (Olympic ninth place) and representing Australia in two World Cross Country Championships.

Recognition — something you didn't get (and, largely, still don't) for a national track or cross country title, but you did get by taking part in a mass-participation, community event such as the marathon.

With the 10th staging coming up, last year's marathon result book made a point of listing a group of runners — dubbed Spartans — who had run each of the nine Melbourne Marathons. The Spartans featured prominently in the publicity for the 10th race and were issued with a special singlet to distinguish them from their fellows.

There are many others, though, whose ten-year involvement should also be acknowledged. The two councils responsible for either end of the course — Melbourne City Council and the City of Frankston — have been involved with the race from the beginning.

Sponsors 3MP, Bay City Radio, have been involved since the first Melbourne Marathon. So, too, have St John Ambulance, the Australian Sports Medicine Federation and the Victoria Police, all of whose cooperation ensures the provision of essential services to the race.

What runner would do without his or her drinks, or does not give thanks to the officials who ensure that the race start is orderly and the finish both efficient and compassionate at the same time? Frankston (the start this year), Springvale-Noble Park, Sandringham and Glenhuntly (drink stations) Athletic Clubs and the Victorian Cross Country League (the finish) have all assisted in some form each year.

Of the committee, chairman Brian Dixon, race director Ted Paulin and secretary Win May have also had a ten-year involvement.

Some fascinating battles looked in store as the field lined up. Defending champion Richard Umberg of Switzerland was back. American Ric Sayre, who runs marathons at a greater frequency than most of us do races, and Pole Jerzy Skarzynski, on his third visit to Melbourne, looked, with Umberg, to be the class of the field.

The other internationals lining up included Skarzynski's teammate, Wojciech Ratkowski, Scotland's Frank Harper and Japan's Yuzen Segami.

Maurice Hearn looked the pick of the local runners, but his race plan

called for a conservative start, then coming through (hoping to do so with the same effect as last year when he stormed home to finish first Australian).

The women's race looked to be between 1981 winner Jackie Turney, making a comeback after a crippling bout of osteitis pubis, and her training partner Julie McKie, a veteran of quite a few Melbourne marathons but a big improver through the winter of 1987.

After a cautious start, it was again Umberg who provided the race's dramatic move. Last year, the Swiss runner had looked 'gone' at 30 km, only to storm home over the top of Skarzynski and Tanzanian, Umbe Slaa.

After five kilometres — in just over 16 minutes, 2:15-2:16 pace — Umberg sped up noticeably. Sayre let him go, but Skarzynski, a man who has never won a marathon, wasn't about to risk his chance of winning this day disappearing so soon. He held the defending champion through a second five kilometres in 15:26, before letting go and drifting back to the pack.

Sayre was content to take his chances. Normally a marathon-amonth runner, he had only started in four in 1987 and, worse, finished only two.

Buy the time Umberg reached the beaches and bluffs of Beach Road, he knew he was going too fast — "I started to feel the hills," he said.

Sayre, meantime, was making his move. He and a refreshed Skarzynski pulled clear of the chasing pack, then Sayre pushed on alone in an attempt to reel Umberg in. He caught him in Brighton, just near the start of Marine Parade. Umberg hung on gamely to one surge soon afterwards, but dropped off when Sayre again applied the pressure.

Sayre went on to win in 2:14:16. Skarzynski had enough in hand to pass Umberg along St Kilda Road and finish strongly this time — last year he cramped badly through the last five kilometres — in 2:15:14. Umberg held on pretty well to take third 12 seconds back.

The next finisher was a surprise. Mike Bonner, former Kiwi and now naturalised Australian from Perth, had come strongly through the main bunch to take fourth in 2:16:05, slashing 7 minutes off his best time and bettering the W.A. State record of 2:16:07.

Next, and also taking a minute off his previous best, was Yuzen Segami in 2:17:09. Segami was here in the forefront of what will surely become a profitable relationship for the Melbourne Marathon, a sister-race agreement (signed the day after the race) with the Nikkan Sports Presssponsored Lake Kawaguchi Marathon.

Maurice Hearn, though not coming through to the same effect as last year, finished sixth in 2:18:27. Hearn ran 2:18:56 in August's Gold Coast Marathon, only to find that the course was 278 metres short, so he was more than consoled to have run faster on the time-tested Melbourne course.

The five kilometres into Brighton was also where the women's race was decided. Jackie Turney had run behind, but within sight of, Julie McKie from the start. She caught the leader near the 25-kilometre mark and then left her behind after 30.

Turney's time was 2:44:18, almost four-and-a-half minutes slower than her best, but a significant comeback after her serious injury. It was her second win and, fittingly perhaps, Margaret Reddan, the other two-time women's winner, came through for second. After her fast start, McKie faded to fourth behind Trudy Fenton.

The finish-line crowd, enjoying finer weather than the travelling television commentators, did not have long to wait to acclaim the first Spartan. Not surprisingly, in view of his history of high finishes in the race, it was Eric Sigmont, who finished 17th in 2:28:45.

There are only two female Spartans. Shirley Young ran her first Melbourne Marathon at a time when few Australian women were attempting the distance. This year she finished her tenth in 3:39:30.

The oldest Spartan was Dick Kirkman, 69, who fulfilled his aim of breaking four hours this year with a time of 3:56:52.

The Spartan awards were presented by an outstanding marathon veteran, Keizo Yamada of Japan, winner of the 1953 Boston Marathon.

A feature of the Melbourne Marathon has always been the involvement of the 'wheelies', the wheelchair athletes.

Australia's record-holder, Rob Turner from Adelaide, raced to a clear win in 2:07;17, over five minutes ahead of lan Gainey, 2:12:46.

Determining the 'courage' award is always an exercise in discrimination. Jackie Turney, who a little over a year ago recommenced her rehabilitation program with one-minute walks, would have been a worthy candidate, for example.


This year's recipient, though, was one of the Spartans, Frank Biviano of Burwood. After surgery in July to remove a large growth from his upper intestine (which involved two more trips to hospital between then and the race), Frank was lucky to be on his feet, much less running.

He wasn't prepared to give up his chance to complete 10 Melbourne Marathons so easily, though, and Frank's perseverance was rewarded when he finished in 4:37:09.

As an endorsed Bicentennial event next year, the marathon will also feature the 5th AIMS World Congress; with the added benefit of an Olympic year, I suggest you don't miss it in 1988.




Mayor of Frankston, Cr. Leonie Clark, sends them on their way.



Melbourne Marathon Inc. Chairman, Brian Dixon.








President VAA, Stan Guilfoyle, presents Maurice Hearn with Vic. Championship medal.

A Spartan going for the tenth.




Bruce Young, Branch Manager, Mayne Nickless, presents award to Gerry Surridge.

THE SPARTANS

celebrating In the Tenth Anniversary of the Budget Melbourne Marathon there are a number of runners who deserve special acclaim, they are our 'Spartans' - those runners who have run all ten marathons.

The word Spartan was derived from the ancient Greek city of Sparta where the inhabitants were known as Spartans. They were hardy, unflinching persons of courage and endurance — this certainly describes those runners who have run all our marathons.

There are 88 including 2 women, with the youngest, John Fawcett 28 and the oldest, Dick Kirkman 69. Each Spartan received a singlet to identify them with this special achievement, they would be proudly worn in the race.

Our Spartans are drawn from a cross-section of the community and are representative of our marathon competitors. Victorian country Spartans include Russell Parsons, sports master Ouyen High School and his training partner, farmer, Noel Weir, also Stan Hanley, school teacher from Shepparton. Our two interstate Spartans, Dennis Condon, Albury and Bob Royal, Queensland, are both engineers; also the president of the

Victorian Veterans Club, Leo Jones.

Shirley Young, one of the two female Spartans, is an active member of the Victorian Veterans Club and competes each week with her husband Ron; their daughter is Lorraine Jackno who represented Australia in the World Championships in Rome, 1987.

The Budget Melbourne Marathon Friendship Tour of Japanese runners included 1953 Boston marathon winner Keizo Yamuda. Keizo donated four plaques which he presented on race day to the following Spartans: **1st Spartan**

Eric Sigmont


1st Female Spartan Shirley Young 1st Interstate Spartan


We are certainly proud of this fine achievement which now forms part of the history of our great race.

The Marathon has become a major sporting event, this year attracting 3,700 participants from Australia and overseas, of these, 115 were prize winners.


Once again the City of Melbourne with the kind support of HSV Channel 7 conducted the "Family Fiesta" in the beautiful Alexandra Gardens.


