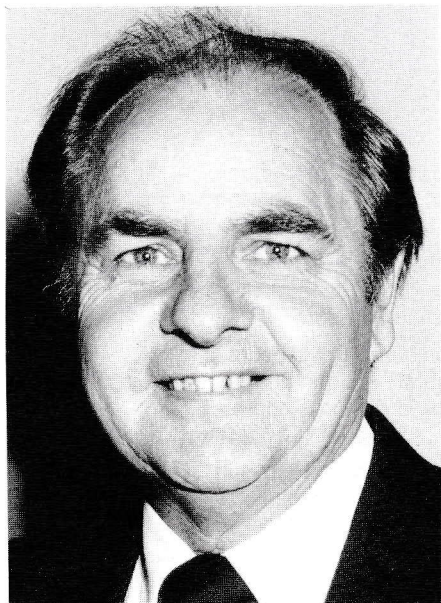

The thirteenth Qantas Melbourne Marathon attracted runners from the largest number of countries yet with 22 nations being represented.

This is reflected by the first three place getters this in both male and female categories. These were, men's: Russell Foley, Australia, Frank Shevlin, Australia, Muhamed Nazipov, USSR and women's: Alevtina Chasova, USSR, Malgorzata Birbach, Poland and Jenny Dowie of Australia.

The increase in the number of international competitors could well be a growing trend since our new major sponsor, Qantas, has recently held highly successful Melbourne Marathon launches in both Japan and Honolulu which it is hoped will encourage greater numbers of participants from these countries for the 1991 race.

Next year, for the first time, the Marathon will be staged during June. This move could well attract additional overseas visitors since this timing will not clash with the northern hemisphere's favoured autumn running season. Airfare and accommodation packages to Australia are more attractive at this time also. An additional benefit to Australian runners will be the late summer/autumn training period instead of winter. Indeed taking all factors into consideration we are hoping for record attendance at the 1991 Marathon.

Some interesting statistics for this year's race are as follows: there was a total of 3881 entries of which 356 were women runners, 1146 were first time marathoners, 12 were wheelchair participants and 466 competitors from interstate or overseas.

For the third year running a Marafun Family Walk and Kids' Fun Run was staged, in conjunction with the Marathon, which was sponsored this year by Life. Be In It with funding from the Victorian Health Promotion Foundation.

It is easy to think that such a popular event as the Melbourne Marathon requires little planning and preparation these days because it has been so successfully organised for the last twelve years. This however is not the case and I always welcome the opportunity to express my thanks to the Marathon Committee who work so hard behind the scenes for many months before and after each race.

Special thanks must also be expressed to the many sponsors of the 1990 Marathon including Qantas Airways Limited, Cities of Frankston and Melbourne, Ansett Airlines, Easy Music 3MP, St. Kilda Road Travelodge, Mobil Oil Australia, Tandem Computers, Saucony, The Met, Institute of Health and Fitness, Melway Publications, Drug Offensive, Murphy Truck Rentals, Cubitt Trophies, Coca-Cola, Retireinvest Pty Ltd, Hawthorn — Financial Planners and the Woodruff Family.

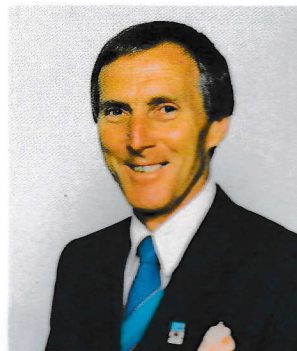

FOLEY

A great Aussie run

STEVE Moneghetti certainly provided the inspiration for the runners in the Qantas Melbourne Marathon with his brilliant marathon victory in Berlin two weeks earlier but unfortunately once again the weather man had not turned on a 'PB' day.

However those that had been following Mona's training notes each week in *The Sun* leading up to the Melbourne marathon would surely have had confidence in his method as they toed the line in Frankston following his sensational 2:08.16 win in Berlin.

As runners gathered at the one mile bridge assembly area it was evident that the marathon was taking a more international stance — the twenty-two countries represented joined with the Australians at the start line to await the count down.

There was an air of excitement at the start. Runners from Okinawa, Japan, had travelled with their own support group and Okinawa television station who were covering their involvement.

The Norwegian team had their supporters out along the course. Svein Lothe, a member of their group had arrived in Melbourne 6.30 am race morning, he was picked up at the airport for the dash to the start. Dietrich Westphal, a regular in our marathon was leading a group from Germany.

The Spartans were assembled in a priority area — Spartans are those runners who have run ten Melbourne Marathons. They are indentified by their green singlets and yellow numbers, a lifetime number they receive after completing 10 Melbourne Marathons.

Shirley Young, an original Spartan was running her thirteenth Melbourne Marathon. In 1990, 61 new Spartans joined her at the start.

The Ballarat marathon hero was on hand in person at the start to give the runners some final words of advice before firing the gun to send the runners on their way up the Nepean Highway towards Melbourne.

The 1990 marathon was the last to be held in the October time slot before the switch in 1991 to the winter month of June and as though 'someone up there' knew it was his last chance, brilliant sunshine greeted the runners alarming everyone that dehydration was going to be a major factor in the race.

Over 3881 runners took part in this year's race the biggest field since 1983.

Among them were three Soviet runners, the first to compete in a marathon in Melbourne since the 1956 Olympics.

They were Victor Taratukhin, Muhamed Nazipov and Alevtina Chasova.

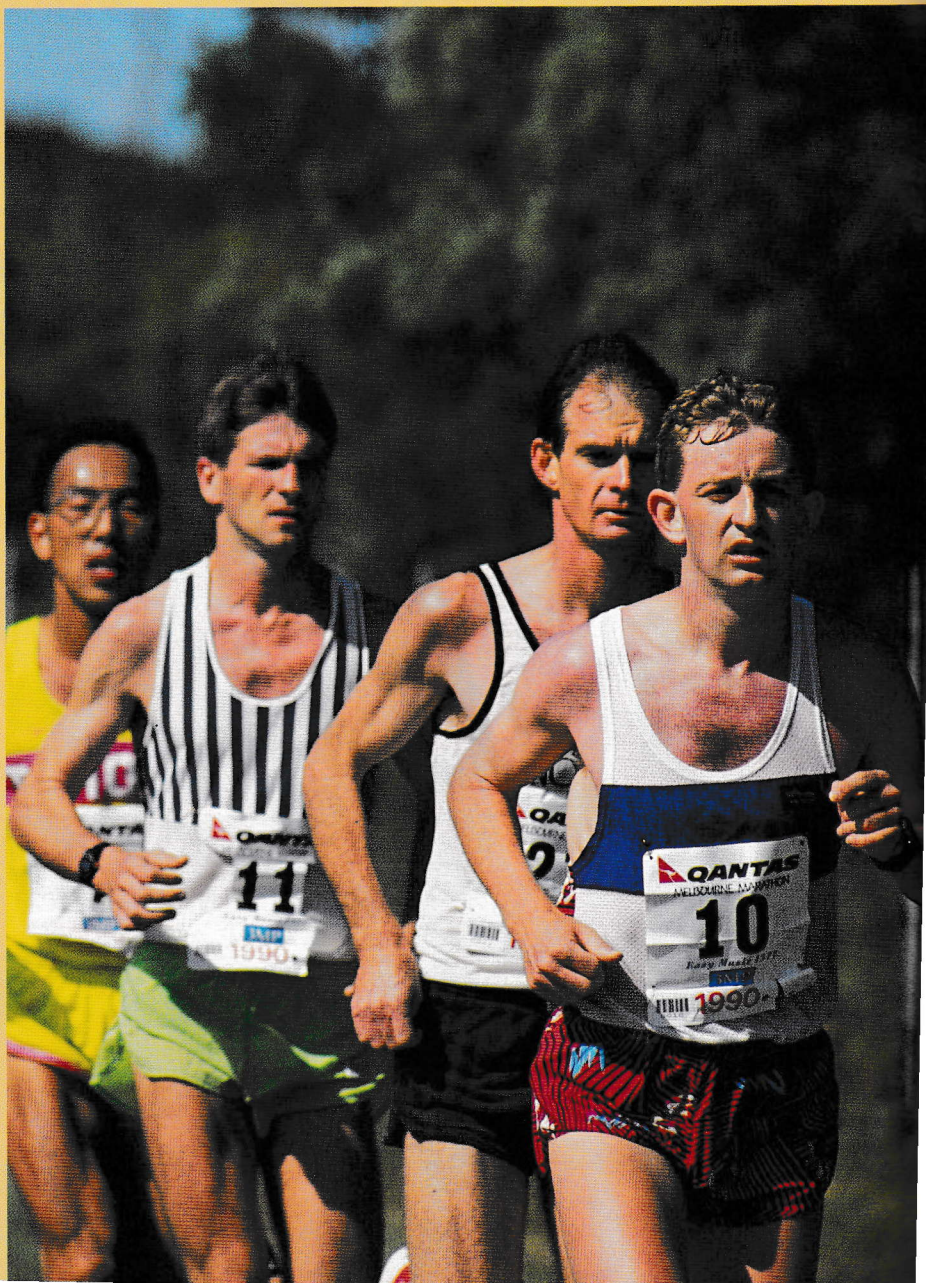
Taratukhin and Nazipov had been training for this race since last February including a spell at altitude.

Unfortunately for them their travel preparations had not been given the same consideration and much of their hopes of doing well were dashed when they arrived in Melbourne the Friday two days before the race after an arduous journey.

However Taratukhin with a best time of 2:12.47 to his credit had the class to still rate him a chance in the race.

Chasova was easily the outstanding woman entrant with a 2:29.49 marathon best from 1988.

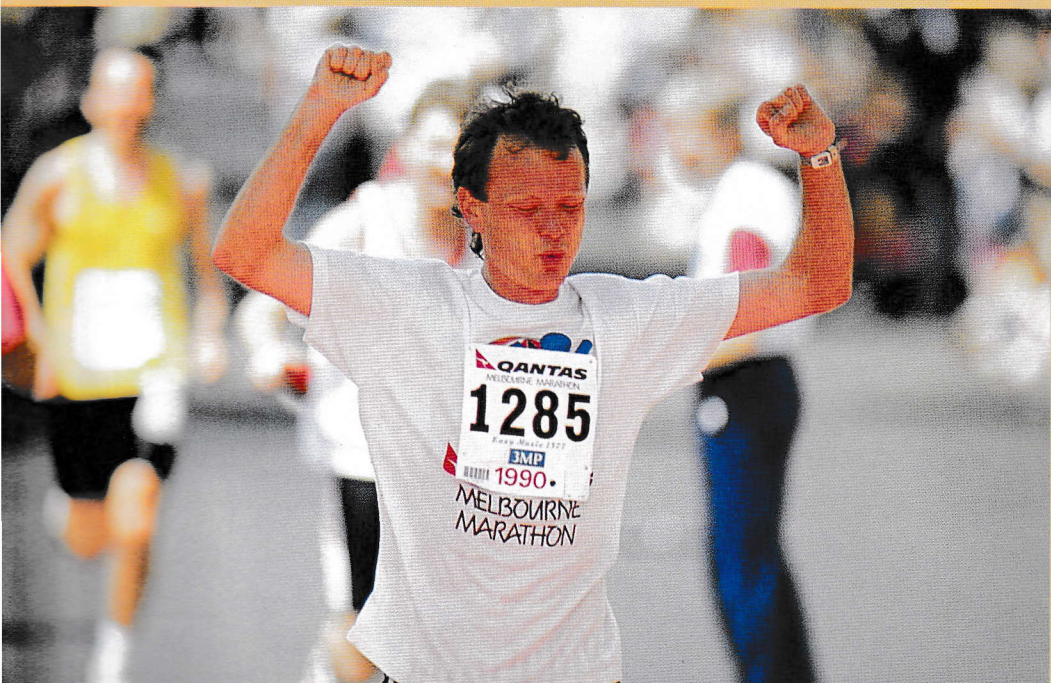


Norwegian Svein Lothe happy to be here, arrived in Melbourne 6.50 am race morning

However she was gradually working her way back to her best form after becoming a mother and combined with the effects of the flight she was no certainty before the race.

Two Australian entrants, Tasmania's Russell Foley and South Australia's Gary Zeuner came into this year's race confident of their chances.

Foley was the first Australian in the 1988 Melbourne Marathon and last year he finished third in the Australian title behind Brad Camp and Pat Carroll in a personal best of 2:15.11.

Zeuner a former national 3000m steeplechase champion was having his second crack at the Melbourne Marathon.

He had recently 'jogged' 2:38 to win the South Australian country title and was content that his preparation would give him a shot at victory.

One of Moneghetti's training companions on his long Sunday runs in Ballarat and a winner of the Adelaide Festival City marathon six weeks earlier. Frank Shevlin was also rated a chance in the race.

For the women's prize, Poland's Malgorzata Birbach was expected to give Chasova strong opposition with last year's winner Colleen Stephens from Colac and Warrnambool's Jenny Dowie being capable of surprising the international visitors.

Russell Foley wasted no time in getting to the front once the usual pretenders had soaked up their moment of glory in the first kilometre.

By 8km the Russians, Taratukhin and Nazipov had surged to join Foley in the lead clear of the second pack headed by Victorian half marathon champion Sean Quilty and joined by Shevlin, the Polish runner Pawel Lorens, NSW's Brian Morgan, Zeuner and the Japanese Tamori.

Chasova immediately established a commanding position in the women's race beginning at record pace leaving the other women behind.

At halfway 1:08.30 Foley continued in front as the two Russians dogged his every stride.

It was already apparent that with the sun shining brightly it would be a race of attrition.

Chasova who was still on schedule for a race record at halfway and well clear of her opposition was beginning to find the 20 degrees too warm to maintain her pace.

At 25km Foley was still going strongly and was aware of the Russians talking together before Taratukhin would surge while Nazipov just sat.

"They were obviously working together but I was feeling comfortable and even with the surges I never found the pace really hard," Foley said.

Behind them the second pack was beginning to split.

Zeuner dropped off perhaps finding the effects of his '2:38 jog' more than he had expected and Lorens too was feeling the heat.

At the 28km Taratukhin folded rapidly drifting back through the field leaving Foley to fight it out with Nazipov.

Foley was confident even with the Soviet athlete tucked in behind him.

"I felt strong but I told myself to be cautious and keep drinking," he said.

"I knew I should not be too aggressive because all I had to do was start cramping and my chance would have been gone."

At the 34km his patience was rewarded as Nazipov slipped behind leaving the Tasmanian with a slight lead of 10m but once the gap was established it quickly began to grow.

Back in the second pack Shelvin who was looking by far the most comfortable made his move and began the chase after Nazipov.

Shelvin quickly cleared out from those that had seemed merely kept him company until he was ready to make his move.

While Foley was now in an unbeatable position along St. Kilda Road the final 5km Shelvin was clearly running faster than anyone in the race as he overtook Nazipov and kept Foley honest.

After 2:20.35 Foley crossed the line outside the Melbourne Arts Centre victorious, the first Australian winner since the last of Andrew Lloyd's three victories in 1981.

It was his third marathon victory but in his own words "easily the best win of my career".

Shelvin took second place and with it the Victorian Championship in 2:22.34 with Nazipov holding on for third in 2:23.15.

Chasova tired a lot in the final 15km but was still an easy winner in 2:39.00 almost three minutes outside the race record.

In second place was Birbach in 2:44.54 with Dowie taking the Victorian title as she finished third in 2:48.32.

There were several great performances, three course records were broken. Colin Fallon, NSW, (50-54 years) 2:41.20; Margaret Ellis-Smith, Vic, (50-54 years) 3:12.14 and Shirley Young, Vic, (60+ years) 3:43.36.

Two overseas runners won Age Group Awards — Teruko Taira, our first Japanese age group winner from Okinawa, (55-59 years), 4:18.13 and Karen Lothe, Norway, oldest woman to finish, 5:48.02

With a new date in 1991 runners in the next Melbourne Marathon will not only look towards more favourable weather on race day but also the pleasant months of April and May to prepare in will provide an added bonus.

The Marathon is now a highlight of the Melbourne Sports Calendar and this year the event attracted even greater numbers of participants and spectators.

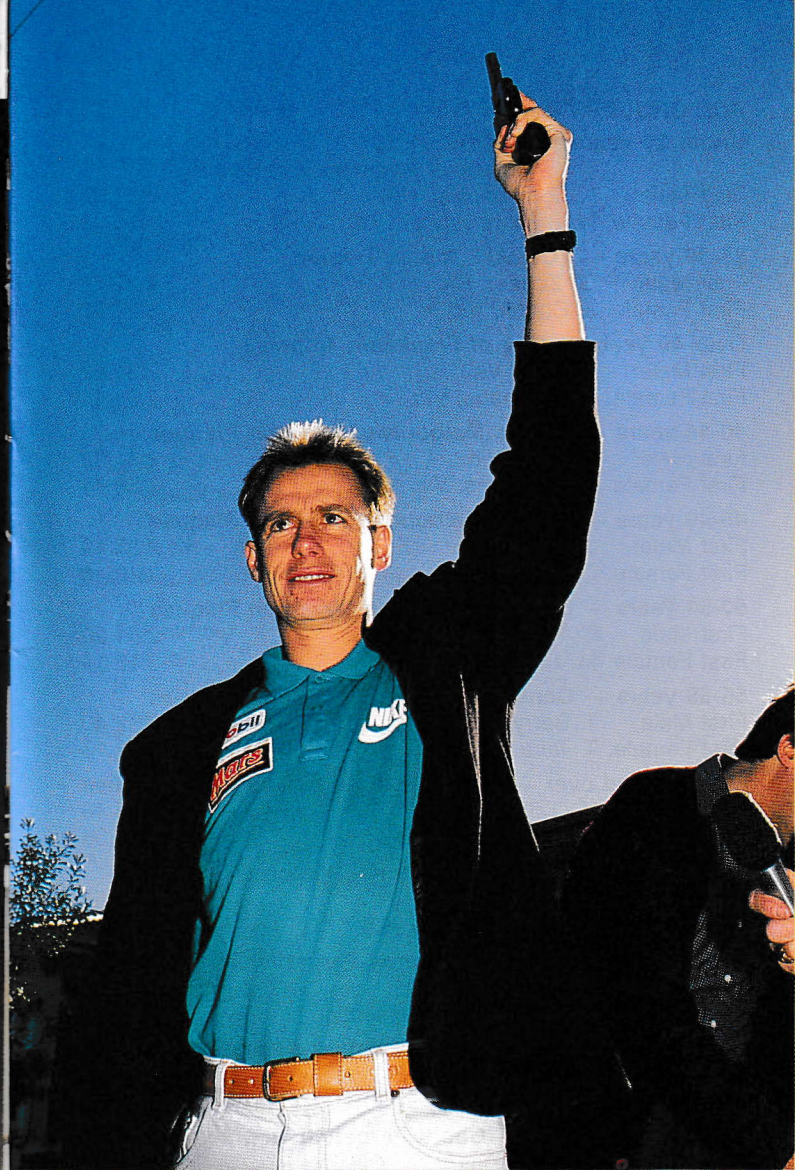

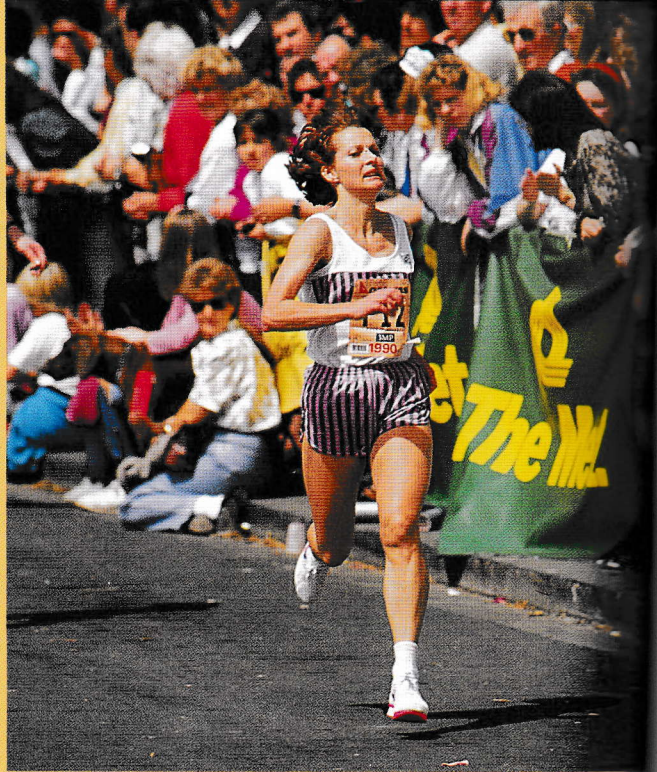

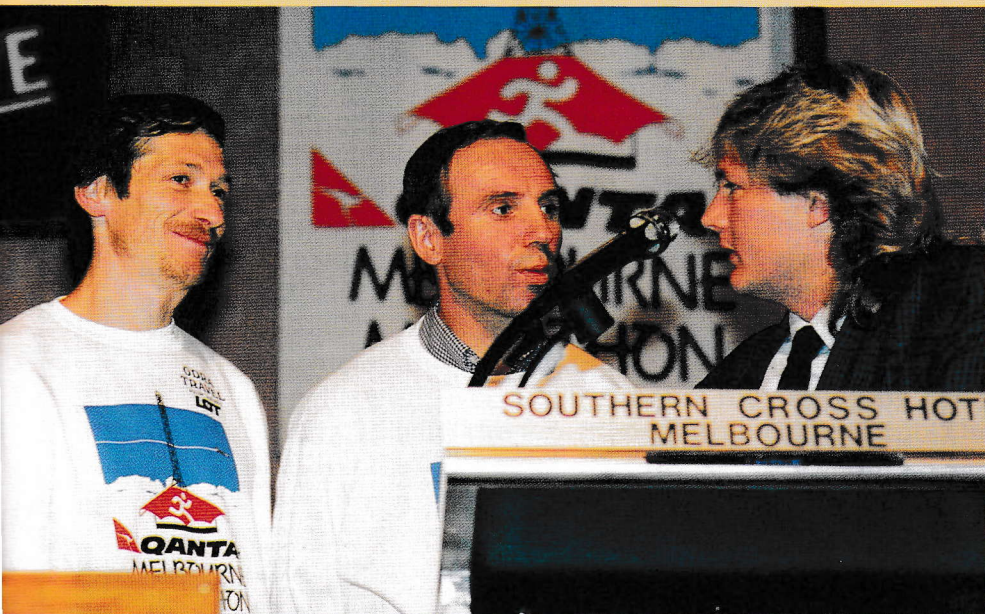

The Breakfast was a great success, plans are underway for 1991, don't miss it.

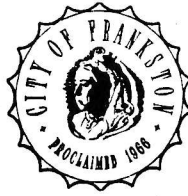

The yellow singlets of the inaugural runners matched with the green issued each following year are easily spotted in the race.

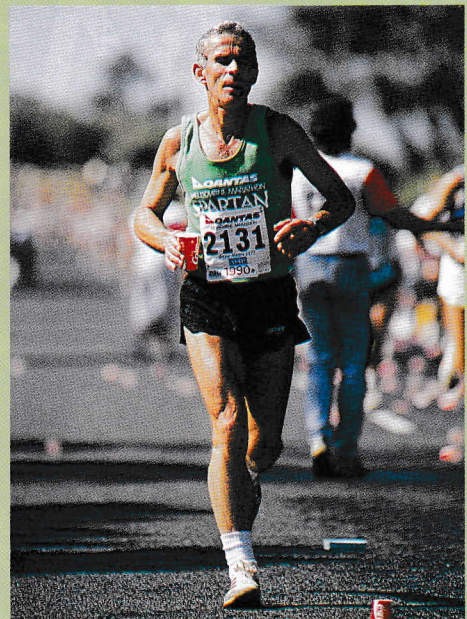

The Association of International Marathons and Road Races lost one of its finest ambassadors on 22 October 1990 with the untimely death at the age of 54 of the President, Robert M. Dalgleish.

Bob was involved in sport for very many years and for the past 12 years had been Sports Promotion Officer for the City of Glasgow. He was one of those responsible for getting the Glasgow Marathon started and continued as Race Director of the great Scottish Run, which succeeded the marathon.

He was a respected member of the International Amateur Athletic Federation, and a former President of both the Scottish Amateur Athletic Association and the Scottish Cross Country Union. He was closely involved with the 1986 Commonwealth Games in Edinburgh.

The Presidency of AIMS was however Bob's proudest and most treasured achievement in athletics, and the Association owes much to the innovation, expertise, time and honesty Bob Dalgleish gave as President. He always had time to listen to every side of a discussion, and stood firm on the policies that have built AIMS to the position of respect and strength it holds today. We will all miss him.

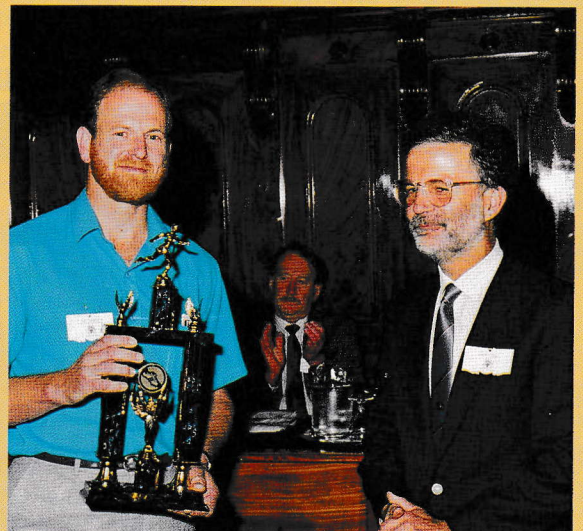

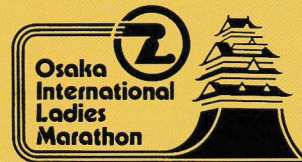
Lake Kawaguchi has four Sister Marathons, including a new member — Berlin, who joined in 1990. The Sister Marathons are:
