A WINDY TEST OF ENDURANCE

Sleeping the night before a big event is never easy, especially when you have no faith in the weather predictions or the event is in Melbourne four seasons in one day! Saturday the 7th of October, the night before the Samsung Melbourne Marathon was to be no different so I prayed to Mother Nature to bring us perfect running weather.

But what is the perfect marathon weather anyway? Some like it hot, some like it cold, and others love the rain while most like a wind on their backs to push them along. Race day arrived and before looking out the window I could hear it, wind and lots of it. My only hope was that it was a southerly and would help push me all the way down Beach Road from Frankston to Fitzroy Street and finish off with a small twister to sweep me along St Kilda Road to the finish line and my waiting family and friends.

Across the three events, the Samsung Marathon 42.195km, Asics Half Marathon 21.2km and the Marafun 7.5km, over 7,300 people woke to the same wind and made their way to the start of their event. It was cold but certainly not freezing, and there were dark patchy clouds but it was certainly still worth the slip slop slap of the sunscreen and hat. People were anxiously preparing for what lay ahead. Everyones preparation was different but something everyone had in common was a reason for being there, and waiting in the toilet line! But what many failed to realise there were more toilets next to the start line without the queues. (Thanks to the runner who pointed me in the right direction!)

As we all huddled together behind the marathon start line and found our dedicated Pacers with their goal time flags flapping in the wind, we were ready and waiting as the sun shone and the young daughter of a soon to be marathon runner sang the National Anthem spontaneously and proudly. It eased the tension and then without warning the skies opened up and rain fell just as swimming legend and Samsung Digital Hope ambassador, Matt Welsh sent us on our way over the 42.195km of bitumen to the finishing arch alongside the Art Centre Spire.

The rain was brief and within two kilometres down the road it had ceased as the sun sparkled on the wet road but the unrelenting wind continued to blow. The good news was it was blowing from the south west and although most of the time it was behind and helping us gain a bit of momentum, it also swirled about causing a few hats to sweep off - Wizard of Oz style. Enthusiasm and hopes were still high and focused determined looks were worn by most.

Oh how time flies when you're having fun. Before we knew it the race was well on its way, everyone had settled into their pace and conversation was starting to spark up. The race favourites were juggling for their positions and checking out the opposition, while the other 1,800 marathon hopefuls were dealing with their own personal battles. Some were ahead of schedule while others lost control and dreams started to slip away. For me, I was in the later; my day came unstuck just 9km into the race thanks to a muscle spasm in my stomach that I carried the entire 33km to the finish line. My frustrations and pain was heard by most along the course and many stopped or slowed down to offer help and words of encouragement.

Putting your mind and body on the line is tough work for most of us, but with it comes a remarkable sense of belonging. The unspoken respect and friendship among the marathon takers is strong and somehow despite it being an individual pursuit, everyone is in it together whether it takes you two and a half hours or five. Encouragement, passing water satchels, sharing words of wisdom or simply running beside another in silence, is something we all experienced when out pounding the pavement. I personally may not have achieved my time goal but what I did achieve is far greater and something that will carry me to the start line again in the future.

A very wise man and president of the Spartans Club, John Dean said to me Sometimes I think we lose sight of what the Marathon is all about and that is a test of one's determination and endurance over a distance of 42.2 km.

But for many the Samsung Melbourne Marathon was more than just a test of determination and endurance, it created a dream come true. Male winner Kazunari Suzuki and female winner Karen Natoli both had their first marathon wins and I think by their facial expressions when they crossed the line their happiness is certainly not in doubt. It was a perfect run for me and to win my debut Marathon at the Samsung Melbourne Marathon with so much local support along the way was a dream come true! a thrilled Natoli said.

As Karen confirmed, the local crowd of spectators were simply marvellous. From start to finish people scattered along the roadside clapping and yelling out words of encouragement. Fitzroy Street was electric and the Samsung cheer squad never stopped for a breath. To the two girls in blue and yellow tracksuits, thank you. You encouraged me to keep moving in a forward direction and pass the time by playing Where's Wally as you popped up all over the course.

What kind of person dedicates a day out of their precious week to volunteer and help others achieve their goals? A very special one and a person that every one of the runners chasing a medal could not do without. Thank you to the volunteers for getting up early, packing our clothes, handing us drinks, sweeping up our mess, encouraging us and of course telling us all how great we look, (even when we know we don't).

The Samsung Melbourne Marathon is in good hands with the team at IMG and the future of this iconic Melbourne event is looking brighter and better than ever. With running at an all time high in Australia and the world there are hundreds and thousands of people toeing the start line at races each year and the Samsung Melbourne Marathon is sure to be on everyone's Must Do list. If the 2006 race is a gauge of what is to come then I can't wait for next year.

See you on the start-line.

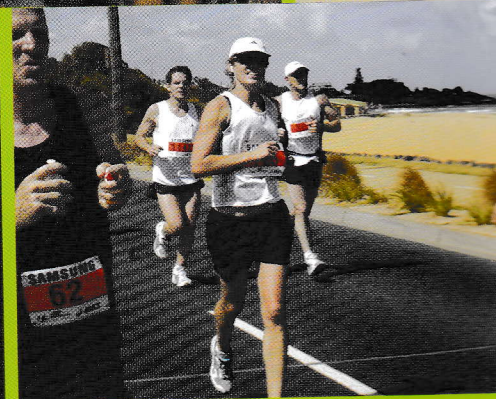
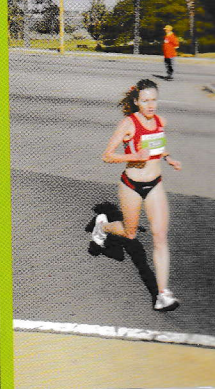
